Division 1 – EDUCATIONAL EXHIBITS

- A. No chapter will be entitled to more than one entry.
- B. Exhibits should be of an educational type rather than agricultural products display; however, agricultural products may be used for decorations or illustrations. The exhibits should explain and illustrate to the public some single aim or activity of the FFA, or an improved agricultural practice. The exhibit should not attempt to portray too many ideas as this is a common criticism of an exhibit of this type.
- C. **Displays must be exactly six feet wide (frontage), two feet deep, four feet high in the rear (electrical outlet available). Displays will be placed on tables provided by the State Fair.**
- E. Every precaution will be taken to protect exhibits from loss or injury but management will not be responsible for loss or injury to exhibits.

- F. Decorative material like crepe paper, plywood, tacks, etc., must be furnished by the chapter. Each exhibitor is responsible for covering the floor of the exhibit space **and making the back of the display presentable as well.** Failure to do so will result in a disqualification.
- G. **Exhibits may be placed anytime on Wednesday, August 9, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. All exhibits will remain in place until 9:00 p.m. on Friday, August 18. Exhibits must be removed on Saturday, August 19 between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. or Sunday, August 20, between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.**
- H. Lighting, motors, and other mechanical devices must be arranged to permit operation during the entire week. All mechanical devices **MUST** be assembled and tested at home before bringing to the fairgrounds.
- I. Flood lights, extension cords, etc., must be furnished by the exhibitor. Exhibits must score at least five hundred points to be eligible for prize money.
- J. Exhibits will be classified into four groups of **four** exhibits each:
 - 3—Gold Emblem Exhibits.....\$150.00 each
 - 3—Silver Emblem Exhibits.....\$125.00 each
 - 3—Bronze Emblem Exhibits.....\$100.00 each
 - 3—Honorable Mention Exhibits....\$75.00 each
 - 1—State Exhibit.....\$100.00
 - Best Overall Educational Exhibits \$10.00 and Rosette

SCORECARD

ALL EDUCATIONAL EXHIBITS WILL BE JUDGED ON THE FOLLOWING BASIS:

- A. Power to attract attention—
 - a. Presents original, unusual, or striking method of display.....150
 - b. Uses life, motion, color, or light without detracting too much from one idea within the class to be presented. (Any life, motion, color, or light should focus on the idea to be presented.).....150
- B. Power to arouse and hold interest - (Develops curiosity or recalls past experience of average person’s interest; interests all classes, young and old, rural and urban).....200
- C. Development of Exhibit—
 - a. Features one idea. (The exhibit should be developed around one central idea. Where more than one idea is used, caution should be exercised to keep the attention focused on the primary one.).....200
 - b. Exhibit is adequately labeled, chapter name and idea clearly and adequately shown. **An attractive 3’ x 6’ FFA banner displaying the chapter’s name, available through the National FFA Organization, is required**.....100
 - c. General appearance of interior of booth, idea, charts, maps, and other illustrative material arranged clearly, briefly, and in logical sequence. (All printing, lettering, and decorations should be artistic, neat, and attractive).....200

CROP EXHIBIT RULES – (Sections 2 - 9)

RULES:

- A. Entries in each of the following classes are limited to one each by any one individual.
 - B. All exhibits must have been produced by members of FFA as a part of their supervised agricultural experience program.
 - C. Containers for all vegetable exhibits shall be provided by the exhibitors. **Container specifications will be provided by the State FFA Office.** The arrangement of the display as well as the quality of the vegetables will be considered by the judge.
 - D. All exhibits of forage crops shall consist of **one standard bale**.
 - E. Tobacco exhibits will consist of a single stalk of tobacco as cut from the field. The stalk must contain all the leaves.
 - F. Potato exhibits shall not be washed. This will result in disqualification. The potatoes should be cleaned by use of a brush.
 - G. Fruits and vegetables should NOT be washed.
 - H. **Officials reserve the right to screen exhibits for quality. Unsound or inferior quality exhibits will be disqualified and discarded.**

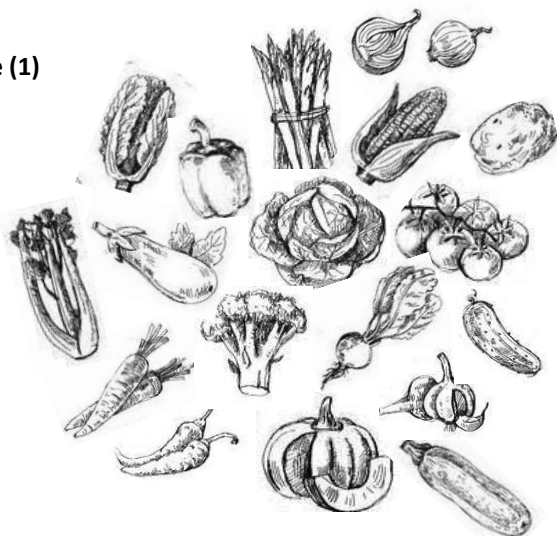

1. Exhibitors must be members of the FFA and have completed at least one year of class instruction in agricultural education. Exhibits must be part of the student's supervised agricultural experience program and carried as a productive enterprise.
2. Exhibits in the following classes are limited to one exhibit by one individual.
3. Eggs must be exhibited in cartons with two rows of six eggs each.

Division 9 - Canned Goods

Rules:

1. Please **exhibit in quart or pint jars**.
2. Please attach entry tag to a standard, sealed jar using a rubber band. **No rusty lids.**
3. Bands should be in place for transporting home canned products; however, bands may be removed when presented for judging. This may aid in determining head space. Replacing the bands for display is preferred.
4. Home canned foods to be judged must have been prepared within one-year prior to the judging date.
5. All exhibits must be heat-processed following current canning guidelines in the USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning.
6. If a product was not processed according to approved recommendations, it will be disqualified.

Division 14 - Agricultural Mechanics Exhibits

Regulations:

- A. Articles exhibited must have been constructed by FFA members either as a part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural education or as part of their supervised agricultural experience program.
- B. **Each agricultural mechanics project must be accompanied by a brief narrative (maximum one page, double-spaced). The narrative may include but is not limited to: student's name and address, FFA chapter, name of item, bill of materials, project cost, hours of student labor, procedures for construction, and/or other related information. The narrative will be laminated and displayed with the project at the fair.**
- C. The judges will place all articles in groups of blue, red and white according to merit. Unworthy projects or **inferior** exhibits will **be disqualified and must be removed from the exhibit area within 24 hours.**
- D. Exhibits will be judged on the basis of workmanship, finish, design, strength, usefulness, and suitability.
- E. The entire article will be considered in the judging process.
- F. An article may be shown only once at the State Fair, but does not have to be constructed during the year it is exhibited.
- G. All items must be unloaded to be displayed and judged.
- H. Exhibits will be judged on construction techniques, selection of materials, and design.
- I. The points assigned to projects are based on the amount and difficulty and cost of moving and the cost of materials. The points given below are for average projects of the kind listed. The superintendent may adjust the points up or down within the range of 50% when a project is unusual in size or difficulty and it appears necessary in order to keep the points in balance.
