Premiums

- 1. Premiums will not be awarded simply because the item is the best of its kind exhibited. The judge retains the right to refuse to award a premium of any kind.
- 2. If there is a class with no competition, the judge must sign a statement that the article is worthy of first place money: otherwise, a blue ribbon will be awarded but second money will be awarded.
- 3. <u>Premiums will be paid according to the records turned in to the Fair office by</u> <u>superintendents, not by ribbons presented.</u>

General Rules and Regulations

- 1. All exhibitors will be charged a \$5 entry fee. Please make checks payable to the State Fair of West Virginia
- 2. Exhibits will not be accepted or released outside of normal check-in and check-out times. No exceptions will be made to this rule.
- 3. All limited classes MUST be entered by paper.
- 4. Fair officials will take reasonable precaution for the safekeeping of exhibits after their final arrival and arrangement in the building but will NOT be responsible for any damage or loss that may occur.
- 5. Fair officials reserve the right to dispose of any decomposing or deteriorating exhibits. Ribbons will be available during check-out time.
- 6. The Judge maintains the right to dismiss exhibits that do not conform to the class description.
- 7. All exhibits must be the product of 2023, unless otherwise stated.
- 8. Entry tags must be securely attached to exhibits prior to arrival.
- 9. No professional exhibitors shall be allowed to exhibit. If discovered that an exhibitor receives more than 10% of their income from practicing the craft they enter, all premiums will be withheld, and the exhibitor will no longer be able to exhibit at the State Fair of West Virginia.
- 10. Exhibitors are limited to ONE (1) entry per class unless otherwise noted.
- 11. Fair officials retain the right to reclass exhibits based on size and class description.

Honey

Scoring for honey will be as followed: Density 20 points Absence of Crystals 10 points Cleanliness 24 points Flavor 8 points Color 8 points Container appearance 10 points Accuracy/ Uniformity of filling 20 points Total 100 points

Wool

1. Fleeces must be entered in the name of the grower.

2. All wool will be placed in a clear plastic bag. (Exhibitor must provide their own bag). Please indicate the breed in which the wool came from on your entry.

3. Exhibitors are limited to two (2) entries in any class; however, no fleece can compete in more than one (1) class.

4. Each fleece must have been shorn in 2021 and represent no more than 12

months growth, except yearling fleeces, which 16 month growth will be allowed.

5. Any fleece entered in the competition should be clean, free of vegetable contamination, dung locks or tags and show no evidence of moths. It should be properly skirted and tied with a paper twine, flesh side out, in a manner to allow it to be handled without falling apart.

Photography

1. Exhibitors are limited to ONE (1) ENTRY PER CLASS AND THREE (3) TOTAL photographs per exhibitor.

2. Judging will be done by the usual standards of subject matter, composition, and photographic excellence. Composition and exposure must be the work of exhibitor, however the developing and finishing may be done by anyone.

3. Photos must be 5"x7" inches and matted on a BLACK 8"X10" RECTANGLE MAT BOARD. No staples on mats.


4. If photo or mat does not meet requirements, the photo will not be judged. Mat must be made like the example provided.

For photograph entries:


Tape entry tag to the center back of the mat board. Name and text on the tag should face the outside. Name, city and state will be covered for judging.

PEOPLE: Adults, children, babies, portraits and character studies or entire figures, alone or in a group where the main subject is the person or persons rather than the environment, close-ups or as a part of a larger composition.

NATURE: Any subject found in nature, plants or flowers, close-ups, etc.

SCENIC: Landscapes, seascapes, architectural and industrial scenes, or any scene that has a fundamental unit of design or mood of such magnitude that all else is subordinate to it. STILL LIFE: Table top photography, flowers, etc. Subject matter must be arranged by the photographer. ANIMALS: Any animal or animals (pets, livestock, zoo, marine) in a natural setting. No posed, official show type photos. CANDID: Not posed, informal.

Horticultural Definitions

Stalk is the stem of the plant.

Spike is a lengthened flower cluster (gladiolus).

Spray is a main stem with wide side branches and blooms on all sides.

Maple Syrup Scoring

Density– Should be greater than or equal to 66.0° Brix and less than or equal to 68.9° Brix. The Brix will be determined by judges using a refractometer.

Color- All entries must conform to the new grading standards and will be judged accordingly.

Clarity- Should be clean and clear with no visible impurities (cloudy, sugar sand, etc.)

Flavor-Should be free of off-flavors

Maple Candy Scoring

Appearance- color, form good no separation or white areas.

Texture- Hardness, crystallinity, surface texture.

Flavor-Representative of maple candy with no off flavors.
